#### **WOODY PERENNIALS**

Most of us think of perennials as herbaceous plants. A perennial is a plant that lives for more than two years. There are many plants in our perennial border that cross over into the realm of woody perennials due to their wooden stems on older growth. Scientifically, trees and shrubs are also woody perennials in their growth habit.

Pruning of these cross-over perennials takes special care. They are better left until well into mid-spring before cutting back. It is important to not cut them to the ground or they probably will die. Leave at least 6" of living woody stem so there will be growth buds.

Examples of woody perennials: *Artemesia* 'Huntingdon' and 'Powis Castle', Butterfly Bush (*Buddleia*), Shrubby Wallflower (*Erysimum* – 'Bowles Mauve'), *Fuchsia*, St. John's Wort (*Hypericum*), Lavender (*Lavandula*), Tree Mallow (*Lavatera*), Russian Sage (*Perovskia*), Cape Fuchsia (*Phygelius*), Lavender Cotton (*Santolina*).

She suggested rhododendron seed pods, nuts and small cones be brought for building the centerpiece.
